Congratulations to Rhys Olson-Keating and Takumi Thapa who scored in the top 20% and 30% respectively in the Maths Olympiad competition, and James Carmichael who scored in the top 20% of the Maths Games Competition.

Most impressive was the performance by Year 4 student Liam Tai who achieved the highest score in both the Maths Olympiad (top 10%) and Maths Games (top 2%).

I am very pleased to say that our General Assistant, Greg Poynter, is back at work following an injury. It was difficult to find a replacement for him so we are looking forward to getting things back in order. Poppy Krilis has returned from leave also. Thank you to Amanda McKenzie for relieving as School Admin Manager in her absence, ably supported by the rest of the office team.

IMPROVEMENTS TO INTERNAL AND EXTERNAL SPACES

As you are aware, there has been a tremendous amount of work done over the past few months. Angela and the rest of the staff have worked hard to minimise disruption to teaching and learning and to our school community. Under Department of Education funding for programmed maintenance, every room in A block has been painted and the big, old 1960s cupboards and red plastic sinks have been replaced in each room. Pop your head in and have a look in one of the classrooms. They are really lovely and bright and airy and you get a much better sense of what they were originally like. We have also had a number of corridors and foyers painted or about to be painted. During the Christmas holidays there will be new vinyl laid in a number of areas and carpet replaced where the big cupboards were. There is also quite a bit of asphalting to be done—between the walkway and the big tree and between the hall and the library. While all this work was being completed it was just not possible to work on other areas but we are now able to proceed with those.

We are currently working in partnership with the Inner West Council and Department of Education to move ahead with our plan to have as much solar power as possible. An Independent feasibility study is being completed to ascertain the location of the panels, how many panels we will need and the cost. We have also received quotes for air conditioning for those rooms not already fitted with it and will proceed with that work as quickly as possible.

We are awaiting a quote for the upgrade of the hall audio visual system and an accessible stage and also for a number of landscaping areas.

A FURTHER WORD ON THE CANCELLATION OF THE FAMILY BREAKFAST

Our decision to hold a Family Breakfast instead of our traditional Mothers' Day and Fathers' Day stalls didn't work out quite as planned. It was a good idea for a number of reasons, particularly in trying to be more sustainable and reduce the amount of packaging and possibly unwanted items we create, but quite understandably the small group of very hard working Year 6 parents doing the fundraising for the Year 6 Farewell felt it was a lot of work for them when it wasn't really needed. It was then a little late for the staff to step in and coordinate it. There was certainly no intention to cancel recognition of mothers and fathers! In 2020 we will definitely celebrate these occasions in some way as a school community, though we will still commit to holding events which are environmentally sustainable.

GREAT THINGS HAPPENING IN OUR PRESCHOOL

The work of our pre-schoolers and their teacher Sepfora Amanatiadis has appeared in a National Science Week publication entitled *Inspiring Ideas for National Science Week—Early Childhood Activities*, reproduced here.

Our two preschool teachers, Sandy Dorn-Steger and Sepfora Amanatiadis, are highly regarded beyond our school for their Early Childhood expertise. Last week they hosted the whole Rozelle staff in the preschool for a professional learning session on the importance of developmental play and of students developing their gross and fine motor skills to promote a range of skills but particularly literacy improvement, not just at the preschool level.

We have recently been provided with a grant of \$40000 from the Department of Education to further develop our preschool outdoor area, supplemented with some school funds. We will soon be getting a new sandpit and shade shelter, bike track and dry creek bed with bridge and the mulch topped up.

The \$1250 raised by the preschool cake stall at the Rozelle Collectors' Market will be used to buy a new cam kitchen. Thank you to the parents who supported that fundraising initiative.

The interior of the preschool will also get a bit of a make over within the next year with painting works and an upgraded kitchen.

THE IMPORTANCE OF PLANTS

Children aged from 4 to 5 at Rozelle Public School Preschool grew succulents from small cuttings to learn how plants grow.

The students brought in empty jars and lids from home to put the plants in. They chose from a range of succulents, such as the jade plant. They put one cutting into a jar with soil, and another into a jar with water so they could see the roots grow. They watered their plant each time they came to preschool and observed the changes in growth. More than 40 parents and grandparents came in to help with putting the plants into the jars, making it a big community event.

'The children really liked that they had a project to do that was their own, and that it was ongoing. They also got to take their plant home at the end of the year,' said Sepfora Amanatiadis, a teacher at the school.

'They also participated in other nature-focused activities. There was an etymological dig in the garden where children could find, observe and identify centipedes, slaters and other creatures... kids love bugs,' said Sepfora. 'We also had an archaeological dig where the children had to uncover buried dinosaur bones in the sand pit — they then had to identify them from the various books and charts about dinosaurs. They learned to do the investigating themselves!'

'The succulent activity was the most exciting for them because the parents got their hands dirty,' Sepfora reflected.

Making copies

Growing a new plant from a cutting of a piece of stem is a form of ancient cloning – the new plant that grows will be a genetic replica. Some plants can even be grown from a cutting of a leaf.


